14. When was the last time you seized an opportunity to witness for Jesus? What happened? What encourages you as you hear about Peter in this passage?

15. From Peter's sermon what key information would be important for non-believers to understand? Who do you need to talk to about these things?

## **Getting Started**

## **Digging Deeper**

4. Compare Peter and the other disciples in Matthew 26:56, John 18:25-27, and 20:19 with their actions here in this passage. What do you think accounts for the great differences?

8. What terrible crime had Israel recently committed that Peter points to in verse 23? What does the quotation from David in Psalm 16:8-11 say that God had done to redeem His people?

5. What does the prophecy from Joel 2:28-32 that Peter quotes in verses 17-21 have to do with what had just happened at the beginning of Acts 2?

9. What was in Peter's message that would have brought people to the place of being "cut to the heart" in verse 37?

6. This is the beginning of a new age. Jesus had finished His great work of redemption. What more had to be done to finish God's plan of salvation for mankind?
