

8. Throughout this passage what do Paul and Silas' actions show about their own character and their commitment to Christ?

5. What was the perspective of this girl's owners in verses 17-21? What do they stand to gain or lose regarding their slave girl?

9. Describe what the jailer was going through in this passage from the time of the earthquake to his subsequent conversion to Christ. What seems to have touched his heart the most?

6. What did Paul have to do in verse 18? What accusations did the slave owners bring against Paul? On what basis would the crowd and the local magistrate have gotten involved in this situation? (V22-24)

10. In what specific ways did the jailer express his new found faith in Christ? How legitimate is his conversion to Christ?

7. What is so amazing about Paul and Silas' reaction to all of this in verse 25? How might their actions in prison have affected their own hearts? The hearts of the other prisoners? The heart of the jailer?

11. Given the charge against them in verses 20-21, why would Paul insist on his rights as a Roman citizen? What difference did this move make with the authorities? Why?
